The feast of Our Lady of the Rosary was established by Pope St. Pius V in 1571 as a celebration which commemorated the naval victory of the Christian fleet at the Battle of Lepanto. This victory was attributed to the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary, whose help was invoked by praying the Rosary. This significant event demonstrated the power of the Rosary and solidified it as a powerful tool for spiritual and temporal victories. Pope Leo XIII, who deeply appreciated the value of the Rosary, officially dedicated the month of October to the Holy Rosary through an encyclical published on September 1, 1883. In his message, he admonished the faithful to dedicate this month to the Queen of the Holy Rosary, seeking her intercession for the Church's needs.

## Deputy Grand Knight's Report

Brothers,

As we enter the month of October, we remember the month of October ([Overview](#) - [Calendar](#)) is dedicated to the Holy Rosary. According to an account by fifteenth-century Dominican, Alan de la Roch, Mary appeared to St. Dominic in 1206 after he had been praying and doing severe penances because of his lack of success in combating the Albigensian heresy. Mary praised him for his valiant fight against the heretics and then gave him the Rosary as a mighty weapon, explained its uses and efficacy, and told him to preach it to others.

"Since the prayers of the Rosary come from such excellent sources — from Our Lord Himself, from inspired Scripture, and from the Church — it is not surprising that the Rosary is so dear to our Blessed Mother and so powerful with heaven.

"If we consider the power of the Rosary as seen in its effects, we find a great abundance of proofs of its wonderful value. Many are the favors granted to private individuals through its devout recitation: there are few devoted users of the Rosary who cannot testify to experiencing its power in their own lives. If we turn to history, we see many great triumphs of the Rosary. Early tradition attributes the defeat of the Albigensians at the Battle of Muret in 1213 to the Rosary. But even those who do not accept this tradition will admit that St. Pius V attributed the great defeat of the Turkish fleet on the first Sunday of October, 1571, to the fact that at the same time the Rosary confraternities at Rome and elsewhere were holding their processions. Accordingly, he ordered a commemoration of the Rosary to be made on that day. Two years later, Gregory XIII allowed the celebration of a feast of the Rosary in churches having an altar dedicated to the Rosary. In 1671, Clement X extended the feast to all Spain. A second great victory over the Turks, who once, like the Russians, threatened the ruin of Christian civilization, occurred on August 5, 1716, when Prince Eugene defeated them at Peterwardein in Hungary. Thereupon Clement XI extended the feast of the Rosary to the whole Church.

Many thanks to all the Knights who have contributed in any way to our Council this past year, through service or through simple prayers. We are so fortunate through the Grace of God to have such a strong group of Men dedicated to the ideals of our order, Fraternity, Charity, and Unity.

Special thanks to those who helped with the Parish Picnic. It was much appreciated.

## Chaplain's Message

This month, we celebrate our 40 Hours and our patronal feast on October 10. Our great patron, St. Leo, is remembered for a great many things. He faced down Attila the Hun during his invasion of Italy in 452. Little is known about this meeting, but the outcome was the withdrawal of the Huns from the vicinity of the holy city. Legend says Attila saw a vision of Sts. Peter and Paul behind the pope and was thus convinced that attacking the city would result in his own defeat and death. In any event, the great Attila, conqueror of the world, died ignominiously of a nosebleed the next year, his empire collapsing after his death into warring factions and tribes.

St. Leo is remembered for much more, however. His famous Tomus was lauded by the Council of Chalcedon in 451 and embraced as the definitive teaching on the Person and natures of Christ ('one person, two natures'). His sermons on Christmas (*Sermones* 21-28) make up a good deal of the basis of the Church's teaching on the Incarnation. He was a tireless defender of the primacy of Rome, a supporter of the poor and the weak of his countrymen, and a fearless preacher against heresy. He was a giant of a man, and we owe him much.

One of his lesser-known contributions is found in Sermo 74, his second sermon on the Ascension. In it, he writes, "And so that which till then was visible of our Redeemer was changed into a sacramental presence, and that faith might be more excellent and stronger, sight gave way to doctrine, the authority of which was to be accepted by believing hearts enlightened with rays from above." This is so profound and is essential to understanding the sacraments.

We tend to think that those who knew our Lord on earth were more fortunate than we are. That they met Him and so were able to be surer of their faith. This is a mistake! When our Lord ascended into heaven, He said, *But I tell you the truth, it is better for you that I go. For if I do not go, the Advocate will not come to you. But if I go, I will send him to you* (Jn 16:7). When the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, came among us, our Lord Himself became accessible through the mysteries of the sacraments. Thus, when we receive a sacrament – or, indeed, when we pray! – we encounter the real Christ. Not just our idea of Him, but He Himself. What was visible in Him *was changed into a sacramental presence*. A sacrament is an encounter with God. And St. Leo gave us the language to express that.

St. Leo the Great, pray for us!
